PROTECTION OF SURVEY MARKS

THE Surveyor-General (Mr. W. V. Fyfe) is gravely concerned by the frequency with which survey pegs and other marks are destroyed or removed by farmers during fencing and other operations.

Survey pegs, posts, spikes and other marks are the property of the Crown and are intended to show permanently on the ground, the position of surveyed lines or points.

Their removal or disturbance is illegal and penalties are provided under existing law for any interference with survey marks.

It is felt, however, that a wider knowledge of the permanent nature and value of these pegs, spikes, marks, etc., would render prosecutions unnecessary.

Existing survey marks serve as a basis for future work and their removal creates

serious difficulties when subsequent surveys are made. If a farmer wishes to sell a portion of his land, for instance, the removal of the original survey marks will necessitate costly re-surveying.

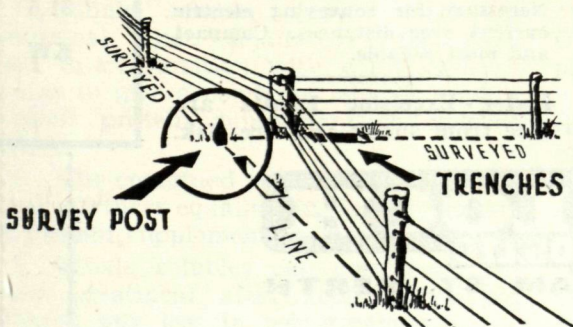
The cost of such work to land-owners, local governing bodies and Government authorities has, in many cases, been particularly heavy.

The Department of Lands and Surveys would welcome the co-operation of farmers and others in protecting existing survey marks and offers suggestions indicated in the sketch for leaving these marks intact when erecting fence-lines.

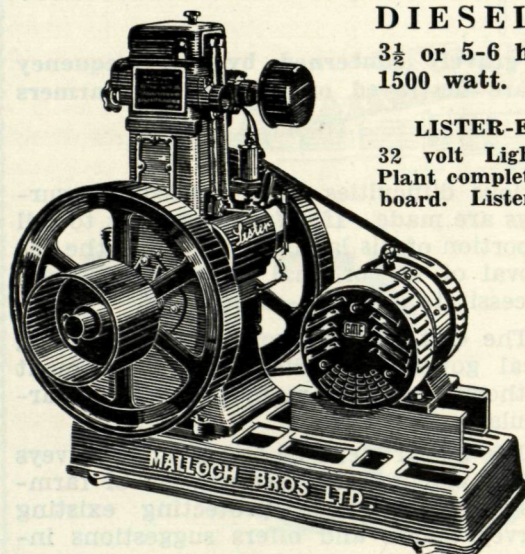


• STRUTS NOT SHOWN

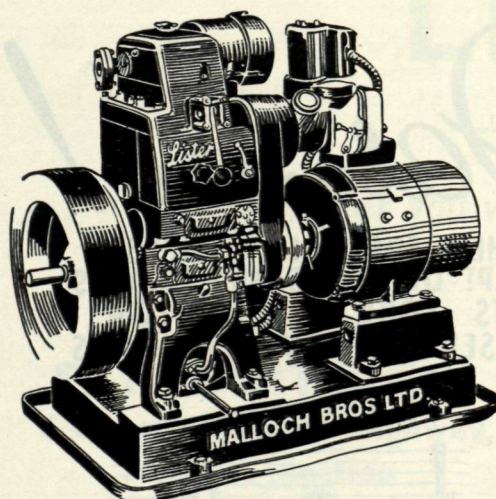
